A vigorous and internationally respected scholar and social historian, he was also one of the most controversial. Many people know Professor Robertson for his influence in establishing the social sciences in post-revolutionary France and his contributions to UNESCO. His biography of the French Revolution has been widely acclaimed. He had however to leave France before the authorities could discover his role in an antigovernment plot to assassinate Charles de Gaulle. In 1986, he was appointed to the Radcliffe Research Professorship at Harvard, where he taught courses in the History of American Civilization, the History of France, and the History of Modern Europe. In 1995, he was appointed Mc-Gill Professor of Modern European History. Professionally, Sidney Robertson has a great sense of professional responsibility. He has trained many young historians and is a very engaging and generous teacher. He is currently directing the Canadian Association for History Studies (CAS), which is affiliated to the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC), to consolidate and enhance the post-graduate research in history. To this end, he has gathered exceptional teams of teachers, including The Alan P. Fitch School Director, Dr. Robert Sappington.
